Tourism Fiji keen for cruise growth

AN INCREASING number of cruise ships are visiting Fiji, with local tourism authorities hoping the arrivals will give passengers a taste of the destination which makes them return for a longer stay in the future.

Speaking to *Cruise Weekly* in Denarau this week at the 2019 Fijian Tourism Exchange (FTE), Tourism Fiji CEO Matt Stoeckel said the cruising sector was an important contributor to the industry, with both large and small ships welcome.

Cruises out of Australia and New Zealand generally only include visits to Fiji on itineraries of seven nights or more, often visiting Suva and Lautoka, where there are deep water ports.

Denarau, with a wide variety of activities available, is also popular, but requires tendering.

Stoeckel was particularly enthusiastic about the small ship cruising sector, with local operators including Blue Lagoon



Cruises, Captain Cook Cruises, Liveaboard Cruises and Tui Tai Adventure Cruises, among others.

"Small ships allow travellers to see some of the untouched, pristine parts of Fiji," he said, highlighting voyages to the country's Lau archipelago as "something that should be on everyone's bucket list".

Flexible three- and four-night itineraries were also an ideal complement to resort stays, Stoeckel added.

Tourism operators in other

parts of Fiji are also gearing up to offer product for cruise visitors, including the Koro Sun Resort on the island of Vanua Levu, near Savusavu Bay which also regularly welcomes vessels.

Teach a ship to be fuelled by fish and it will cruise for a lifetime

EXPEDITION cruise line
Hurtigruten has announced a
new partnership with Norwaybased Biokraft to supply the
cruise line with liquefied biogas
(LBG) made from dead fish and
other organic waste.

In what Hurtigruten is describing as "the largest ever global contract for supply of (LBG) to a shipping operator," the deal will include daily deliveries of the climate-neutral fuel to its vessels.

"This is a large and significant move for Hurtigruten, for Biokraft, for green solutions in the global shipping industry, and most importantly, for the environment," said Hurtigruten CEO Daniel Skieldam.

"What others see as a problem,

we see as a resource and a solution...while other operators are running on cheap, polluting heavy fuel oil, our ships will literally be powered by nature," he added.

Hurtigruten had previously revealed plans to replace the engines of six of its ships with LBG and battery-powered alternatives by 2021.

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Short dreams added

DREAM Cruises has announced new cruise options for Australia's east coast, including a series of short sector itineraries and a new embarkation point in Newcastle.

In addition to seven-night coastal cruises to Queensland and Tasmania, Dream has six new short cruise options to choose from, including one-way between Brisbane and Sydney, with two, three-, four-, and five-night itineraries available.

Two departure dates are also now available from Newcastle - a four-night cruise leaving 04 Nov to Brisbane, stopping at Gladstone and the Sunshine Coast, and a seven-night roundtrip from Newcastle on 25 Nov, visiting Gladstone, Brisbane, Sunshine Coast and Sydney.

The cruise line's Explorer Dream vessel will be its first to homeport in Australia, based out of Sydney's White Bay Cruise Terminal (CW 13 Sep 2018).

Sailings will also give passengers the chance to experience the full fleet of Zodiacs, kayaks and standup paddleboards available.

The latest expeditions coincide with the 60th anniversary of Galapogas National Park and Charles Darwin Foundation, established on the centenary of Charles Darwin's Origin of the Species, with cruises designed to promote the importance of the conservation with regard to wildlife and flora in the region.

Oceanwide ready

OCEANWIDE'S newest ship, m/v Hondius, is gearing up to embark on its first arctic expedition cruise after successfully completing a series of sea trials.

Beginning its Arctic program on 03 Jun, the ship will sail from Vlissingen, Netherlands, making stops in Aberdeen, Fair Isle and Jan Mayen, before reaching Spitsbergen in Norway's archipelago Svalbard.

Passengers will be able to spot polar bears, Arctic foxes, and walruses as well as whales, seals, and seabirds.

Hondius will also undertake an Antarctic cruise program beginning in the 2019 austral summer, visiting the Antarctic Peninsula, the South Shetland Islands, South Georgia, and the Falkland Islands.
