ACA unveils board

THE Australian Cruise Association (ACA) has confirmed its board of management for next year, which will see Chair Philip Holliday remain at the helm for 12 more months.

The Port Authority of New South Wales Chief Executive & Director will be supported by an executive committee comprised of Deputy Chair Brendan Connell (Port of Brisbane) and Treasurer James Coughlan (Shorex Australia).

Kirsty Little (Tasports), and Shayne Murray (Cruise Broome) were also re-elected unopposed, and will join Karlie Cavanagh (Inchape) and Andrew McKinnon (SATC).

Opportunity for fly-cruise



NORWEGIAN Cruise Line (NCL) is answering the demand for the "almost uncapped opportunity" for fly-cruise in the Australian market, NCL Vice President and MD Ben Angell has said.

The local NCL head, speaking at last night's launch of the cruise line's new ship Norwegian Luna (CW yesterday), insisted the time is now for the travel industry to back the fly-cruise market.

"Whilst there are undoubtedly challenges in the local cruising sector, there's almost uncapped opportunity for growth in flight cruise," he said.

"Just 200,000 Australians cruised in other parts of the world, versus 10 million outbound Australian travellers.

"There's never been a better time to position the exceptional value, convenience and almost endless variety and international cruise holiday offers flight cruise presents: an unbeatable holiday proposition, but it also provides a pathway for significant and sustainable growth in cruising for this region," Angell added. Flinders powers up

THE Australian cruise industry is welcoming funding from the Federal Government's Clean Energy Finance Corporation into developing future electrical energy sources at Flinders Port in Adelaide (CW breaking news).

The \$70 million investment from Minister Chris Bowen will see Flinders Port undertake a range of projects aimed at transitioning towards low- and zero-emission services across its shipping operations.

Australian Cruise Association CEO, Jill Abel, told CW there is potential for the initiative to benefit cruise shipping as the freight port is adjacent.

"Onshore power remains a top priority for ACA as we work closely with states and port operators to develop the infrastructure required for cruise ships to access sustainable electricity sources while in port," Abel told *CW*.

"With 61% of the global cruise fleet already equipped to utilise onshore power, we are encouraged by the ongoing discussions within Australian ports to advance this energyefficient solution.

CLIA Australasia Managing Director, Joel Katz, labelled the move "the first critical steps toward providing onshore power capabilities at Australian ports" and a gamechanger for reducing emissions.

Meanwhile, Seabourn Sojourn will be on a 10-day round-trip voyage from Barcelona, positioned in the Balearic Sea for the eclipse.

The ship will now undergo a series of sea trials with Captain Marco at the helm ahead of its formal handover to Disney Cruise Line and trans-Atlantic crossing to its Port Canaveral home port.

Disney Treasure is the sixth ship in the cruise line's fleet, with Meyer Werft engaged to deliver seven more ships over the next seven years including Global Dream, which was acquired two years ago (CW 17 Nov 2022) and renamed Disney Adventure.

Diamond's Japan

PRINCESS Cruises has launched its 2026 Japan cruise season, with Diamond Princess set to operate more than 50 voyages from Jan-Nov 2026. Itineraries on the 2,670-guest ship, which offers an onboard Japanese onsen, will range from seven to 28 days and take guests to cities including Tokyo, Osaka, Kyoto and Hiroshima.

Highlights include 10- and 11-day 'Spring Flowers' cruises, which take in cherry blossoms on Japan's four main islands.
